1. Performance Overview

(1) Overview of Business Results

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, the Japanese economy maintained a gradual recovery trend, supported by factors such as steady inbound demand and improvements in employment and income conditions. On the other hand, the outlook remains uncertain due to concerns over factors such as sluggish personal consumption amid rising domestic prices, U.S. tariff policies and the resulting escalation of U.S.-China trade tensions, and geopolitical risks.

The market for mergers and acquisitions of small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), in which the Company's main M&A brokerage business operates, has been on a medium- to long-term growth trend, on the back of the continued aging of SME business owners and the associated rise in the percentage of SMEs without successors passing on their business to third parties through M&A. Facilitating the transfer of these businesses to a new generation of ambitious management teams is important for preventing valuable operational resources from being wasted and supporting sustainable growth of the Japanese economy, highlighted by the fact that about half of approximately 60,000 companies that were shuttered or dissolved in 2024 had reported profits during their most recent fiscal years (according to the "2025 White Paper on Small and Medium Enterprises in Japan" issued by the Small and Medium Enterprise Agency of the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry). In addition, in recent years, M&A has become a popular option for SMEs not only as a means of business succession, but also as a means to diversify their business and execute their growth strategies, such as innovation-type M&A aimed at creating new businesses and transforming companies. Moreover, the Japanese government identifies the advancement of open innovation as a key pillar for startup development, emphasizing the need to increase M&A between large companies and startups to promote open innovation. In August 2024, the "M&A Guidelines for SMEs" were revised to their third edition, followed by the release of the "Skill Map for SME M&A Professionals (Individuals)" in April 2025. Together, these initiatives represent ongoing efforts to foster an environment that ensures and enhances the quality and scope of services provided by intermediaries and individual advisors involved in SME M&A support.

Within this environment, we undertook a variety of initiatives to develop our M&A consultants and enhance our service quality, such as providing internal training opportunities to enhance client proposal skills and deepen the understanding of M&A Guidelines for SMEs. Meanwhile, we also strove to identify a wide range of M&A needs by rolling out industry-specific online advertisements and proposal-based sales activities. Furthermore, we focused on cultivating new startup-related opportunities in the M&A market by holding monthly networking events through "S venture Lab.," a service designed to promote partnerships between startups and business companies. In addition to domestic transactions, we are also working to secure cross-border deals and expand our business beyond M&A brokerage to include related areas such as financial advisory (FA) services and strategic consulting.

With regard to collaborative efforts involving our business partners, we have welcomed staff from partner financial institutions to enhance their M&A expertise, thereby strengthening our M&A support system.

In terms of recruitment, we actively worked to add new employees with the goal of expanding our business performance and successfully recruited 74 new M&A consultants during the fiscal year under review.

As a result of these efforts, during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, we closed 275 deals (Note 1), compared with 252 deals a year earlier, and 534 contracts (Note 2), versus 490 contracts a year earlier. Additionally, we closed 45 large deals (generating ¥100 million or more in sales per deal) during the period under review, versus 48 large deals in the previous fiscal year. As of September 30, 2025, our new contract count (Note 3) was 1,181, versus 923 as of September 30, 2024.

(Note 1) Number of deals closed:

Number of M&A transactions in which Strike provides brokerage or advisory services (i.e., number of deals).

(Note 2) Number of contracts closed:

Number of contracts on closed M&A deals in which Strike provides brokerage or advisory services (i.e., number of companies). In brokerage services, each deal counts as two contracts (one for the seller and one for the buyer), while in advisory services, each deal counts as one contract.

(Note 3) New contracts:

Number of new brokerage service contracts signed with sellers (or in the case of advisory services, contracts signed, and services effectively commenced).

Consequently, net sales in the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025 was ¥20,314 million (up 12.0% year on year) as the number of deals closed exceeded that of the previous fiscal year, and the average sales per deal closed rose due to the completion of large deals. Cost of sales totaled ¥8,395 million (up 28.6% year on year), reflecting an increase in incentive salaries due to higher sales and increased personnel expenses resulting from the addition of M&A consultants. SG&A expenses amounted to ¥5,586 million (up 15.5% year on year) on increased advertising expenses related to sales activities, an increase in recruitment-related fees due to active hiring efforts, and an increase in training expenses for developing M&A consultants and strengthening compliance. As a result, operating profit came to ¥6,332 million (down 6.5% year on year) and ordinary profit totaled ¥6,341 million (down 6.4% year on year). In addition, as a result of recording gain on sale of investment securities of ¥89 million as extraordinary income and loss on valuation of investment securities of ¥62 million as extraordinary losses, bottom-line profit came in at ¥4,719 million (down 4.7% year on year).

Business results by segment are omitted as the Company operates in a single operating segment of the M&A brokerage business.

(2) Explanation of Financial Position

(Assets)

As of September 30, 2025, current assets stood at ¥21,150 million, up ¥1,922 million from September 30, 2024. This increase was primarily the result of a ¥1,790 million increase in cash and deposits, ¥53 million increase in accounts receivable – trade, and a ¥48 million increase in prepaid expenses.

Non-current assets amounted to ¥3,612 million, up ¥150 million compared to September 30, 2024. This was mainly because of a ¥60 million increase in buildings associated with the relocation of the Takamatsu office and the expansion of the Hiroshima and Sapporo offices, as well as an ¥18 million increase in investment securities.

(Liabilities)

As of September 30, 2025, current liabilities were ¥3,036 million, down ¥887 million from September 30, 2024. This was mainly the result of a ¥340 million decrease in income taxes payable, as well as decreases of ¥240 million in accounts payable - other and ¥83 million in accounts payable - trade.

Non-current liabilities amounted to ¥252 million, down ¥44 million compared to September 30, 2024.

(Net assets)

As of September 30, 2025, net assets totaled ¥21,474 million, up ¥3,004 million compared to September 30, 2024. This was primarily due to a ¥4,719 million increase in retained earnings because of the recording of profit, despite a ¥1,747 million decline in retained earnings owing to the payment of dividends.

(3) Overview of Cash Flows

As of September 30, 2025, cash and cash equivalents stood at ¥20,149 million, up ¥1,790 million from September 30, 2024. Principal factors behind the changes are as follows.

(Cash flows from operating activities)

Net cash provided by operating activities amounted to ¥3,847 million (compared to ¥6,280 million provided in the previous fiscal year). This primarily reflected ¥6,368 million in profit before income taxes, despite ¥1,990 million in income taxes paid, a ¥243 million decrease in increase (decrease) in accounts payable – other and ¥237 million decrease in increase/decrease in consumption taxes payable/consumption taxes refund receivable.

(Cash flows from investing activities)

Net cash used in investing activities totaled ¥314 million (compared to ¥1,045 million used in the previous fiscal year). This primarily reflected ¥246 million in the purchase of property, plant and equipment and ¥102 million in payments of leasehold and guarantee deposits.

(Cash flows from financing activities)

Net cash used in financing activities came to ¥1,742 million (compared to ¥979 million used in the previous fiscal year). The main use of cash was dividends paid of ¥1,742 million.

(4) Future Outlook

In the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, we aim to further step up our proposal activities and strengthen our organizational capabilities to handle new contracts. For contracts acquired through the direct channel, in addition to working to raise the average sales per deal closed, we plan to increase new contract acquisitions through active proposal activities by our expanded team of consultants as well as the hosting of online seminars. We will also continue working to raise the number of contracts referred by our partner organizations by strengthening relationships with them. In terms of the new contracts acquired, we will further our organizational efforts through a team-based approach for M&A consultants to boost the number of deals closed and the efficiency of deal closings. We will also capitalize on our premarketing service in which we search for potential buyers on behalf of potential buyers, to strengthen our relationships with potential buyers.

We will continue to increase the number of outstanding consultants to expand our business, while strengthening human resource development and improving our deal-closing capabilities through enhanced internal training programs. Efforts will focus on raising employees' technical expertise, deepening their understanding of laws, regulations, and accounting systems, and sharing know-how essential for winning and executing contracts. At the same time, we will expand our business beyond M&A brokerage to include related areas such as financial advisory (FA) services and strategic consulting.

We remain committed to active investment for future growth. Along with enhancing our sales efforts through online advertising and online seminars, and actively recruiting consultants, we will also establish a system to ensure

compliance with the M&A Guidelines for SMEs and the self-regulatory rules set by the industry association.

To enhance shareholder returns, our basic policy is to maintain a dividend payout ratio of around 50% of profit. For the fiscal years through September 2027, we plan to temporarily raise shareholder returns and set the annual dividend at ¥180 per share. Should the dividend payout ratio fall below 50% in any given fiscal year, we intend to increase the dividend above ¥180 per share.

In light of the above circumstances, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, the Company forecasts net sales of ¥24,346 million, operating profit of ¥8,370 million, ordinary profit of ¥8,402 million, and bottom-line profit of ¥5,738 million.

2. Basic Policy Regarding Selection of Accounting Standards

The Company applies the Japanese Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (J-GAAP) as its accounting standard to ensure comparability with other companies in the same industry in Japan. With regard to the application of International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS), the Company's policy is to respond appropriately while considering factors such as shareholder composition and trends of other companies in the same industry in Japan.

(Transition to a holding company structure)

At the extraordinary meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 17, 2025, the Company resolved to approve the conclusion of an absorption-type company split agreement with Strike Split Preparatory Company, Ltd., which was established on October 1, 2025 as a split preparatory company for the transition to a holding company structure by way of a company split (the absorption-type company split to be executed under this agreement referred to as the "Absorption-type Company Split") and executed the absorption-type company split agreement on the same day. In connection with the transition to a holding company structure, the Company also resolved to change its trade name to Strike Group Co., Ltd. effective April 1, 2026 (tentative), and to partially amend its Articles of Incorporation to align its business purposes with those after the transition.

The implementation of the Absorption-type Company Split and the partial amendments to the Articles of Incorporation (amendments to the trade name and business purposes, etc.) are subject to approval by resolution at its Annual General Meeting of Shareholders scheduled for December 23, 2025.

1. Background and purpose of the transition to a holding company structure

The Company, under its mission of "Creating partnerships that change the world," has been expanding its core M&A brokerage business while also pursuing growth in adjacent business domains, with the aim of ensuring the continuity and growth of many attractive companies and businesses.

In order to further expand our business and enhance corporate value, we have determined that it would be desirable to establish a group management structure that enables prompt and flexible decision-making. Accordingly, we have decided to transition to a holding company structure. The Absorption-type Company Split will be implemented as part of the transition to the holding company structure.

This structure will enable the holding company to drive the group's overall management strategy, M&A strategy, and governance enhancements, while allowing the operating company to focus on further growth of its existing businesses and expansion into new business areas. Our aim is to become a comprehensive consulting firm that supports every stage of M&A with the optimal organizational framework.

(2) Method of the Absorption-type Company Split

The Company plans to transfer the business to be separated to Strike Split Preparatory Company, Ltd., a wholly-owned subsidiary, with the Company as the splitting entity.

(3) Allotment under the Absorption-type Company Split

As the Company owns all of the issued shares of the successor company, the successor company will not deliver any consideration for the rights and obligations to be transferred in connection with the Absorption-type Company Split.

(4) Treatment of stock acquisition rights and bonds with stock acquisition rights under the Absorption-type Company Split

The Company has not issued any stock acquisition rights or bonds with stock acquisition rights.

(5) Changes in capital resulting from the Absorption-type Company Split

There will be no change in the Company's capital as a result of the Absorption-type Company Split.

(6) Rights and obligations to be assumed by the successor company

On the effective date, the successor company will assume from the Company the assets, liabilities, employment agreements, and other rights and obligations relating to the subject business within the scope set forth in the absorption-type company split agreement. The liabilities to be assumed from the Company will be taken on by way of joint and several assumption of liability.

(7) Prospects for fulfillment of obligations

Having reviewed the anticipated levels of assets, liabilities, and earnings of the Company and the successor company after the Absorption-type Company Split, the Company has determined that there will be no issue regarding the certainty of fulfillment of the obligations to be borne by either the Company or the successor company.
