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1. Results of operations for the period under review

(1) Overview of consolidated financial results for the period under review

During the first nine months ended September 30, 2025, the Japanese economy continued on a gradual recovery trend against the backdrop of improving employment and income conditions, despite the impact of US trade policy being evident primarily in the automotive industry.

Capital investment is showing signs of recovery in the manufacturing industry, with three consecutive quarters of year-on-year increases since the October-December period last year, and positive growth in July and August, according to the "Machinery Orders" report, a leading indicator for equipment and machinery. Corporate production showed year-on-year growth in January-March and April-June according to the "Indices of Industrial Production." However, it experienced fluctuations this quarter, with July showing a decline and August and September showing increases. According to the "Building Starts" statistics, the number of new housing starts in the construction sector saw continuing significant year-on-year decline since April due to the reactionary decline from the rush of applications prior to the reduction of the Article 4 special provision in March, and the total floor area of building starts also has been declining year on year from April onwards.

Looking ahead, while the effects of various policies are expected to support moderate recovery, continued downside risks to the economy due to the impact of U.S. trade policy as well as factors such as the impact of declining consumer sentiment due to continued price increases and of fluctuations in the financial and capital markets mean close attention needs to be paid to future developments.

Also, in overseas economies, although the U.S. is seeing a gradual economic expansion, the impact of the rebound from the rush demand triggered by tariff hikes is seen along with an overall sense of uncertainty, so it is essential to remain vigilant regarding the ongoing impact of trade policies and the like. In China, although the effects of various policies are emerging, the economy has come to a standstill. On the other hand, in Southeast Asia, the economy remains strong mainly driven by domestic demand, and a gradual economic recovery is underway.

Under these circumstances, the MARUKA FURUSATO Group has set forth the VISION of the future we aim to realize: "Towards a world overflowing with 'I want to make this happen!" As we strive to realize management that is conscious of capital costs and stock prices, we are promoting measures aimed at enhancing economic value as well as social and environmental value. And to maximize synergies at an early stage, we will launch UNISOL Corporation as the core company of the Machinery & Tools Segment in January 2026. With regard to these initiatives for increasing corporate value, we aim to achieve our goals in the final year of the Medium-Term Management Plan "UNISOL" (fiscal year ending December 31, 2026).

Machinery & Tools Segment

Domestic orders for machine tools, a key indicator in the Machinery Sector, exhibited a 2.3% year-on-year increase in January-March, a 4.2% year-on-year decrease in April-June, and a 1.4% year-on-year increase in July-September.

In this environment, in the direct-sale business in the domestic market of the Machinery Sector in this segment, net sales declined 14% year on year. Regarding orders, while mixed results were seen in automotive-related orders depending on the manufacturer, cumulative orders exceeded the previous year's level. This was driven by factors such as investment to expand and enhance facilities and demand for replacing aging equipment within certain manufacturer groups, as well as enthusiasm for capital investment in some sectors such as agricultural machinery. In wholesale business in the domestic market as well, net sales declined 3% year on year. With orders expanding broadly across all main end user industries, cumulative orders increased year on year, including for major projects secured through subsidy approvals.

Overseas, net sales increased 14% year on year in North America. Sales to local companies temporarily slumped due to tariff impacts, but they have been on a recovery trend, particularly for machine tools. And cumulative orders exceeded those of previous year, driven by strong performance in sales to Japanese companies. In China, net sales declined 44% year on year. Despite the saturation of Chinesemade EVs and the further weakness of the Japanese automotive industry, some bright signs emerged such as large-scale orders for new equipment. In Southeast Asia, net sales declined 6% year on year. Conditions varied by country in Southeast Asia. Business in Thailand remained strong, driven by the commencement of deliveries for several major projects for multiple Japanese companies. In Indonesia, there was a temporary dip during a transitional period for recording sales. Meanwhile, in Malaysia continued postponements of new equipment orders were seen for the mainstay automotive sector.

Industrial production, a key indicator in the Tools Sector, showed for the automotive industry an 11.0% increase year on year in January-March, a 1.3% increase year on year in April-June, and a 1.8% decrease year on year in July-September. For the production machinery industry, it showed a 0.1% decrease year on year in January-March, a 0.3% decrease year on year in April-June, and a 1.5% increase year on year in July-September.

In this environment, in the direct-sale business in the Tools Sector, net sales saw a 3% year-on-year decrease, primarily automotive related. Production at major automakers recovered steadily, but the situation for new construction and renewal of equipment remained challenging. In wholesale business, net sales saw a 0.8% year-on-year increase. Amidst challenging conditions in the machining and embedded equipment sectors due to reduced capital investment in the automotive and semiconductor industries, the equipment sector, especially environmental and energy-saving products, saw growth.

Construction Products Segment

Total floor area of building starts for steel frame structures, a key indicator in the Building Products Sector, showed a 9.0% decrease year on year in January-March, a 5.9% decrease year on year in April-June, and a 9.2% decrease year on year in July-September.

In this environment, the Building Products Sector experienced a 10% decrease year on year in net sales. Extended project timelines due to labor shortages and policies of eight days off every four weeks at construction sites have reduced the number of projects completed within a given period. The selective bidding practices of construction companies have led to a continued slump in the number of small-to-medium-sized projects. Furthermore, delays and cancellations have begun to emerge even in large-scale projects. Those combined to result in a trend of further declines in sales of building products.

Net sales in the Piping Products Sector declined 0.6% year on year. The volume of orders declined significantly over the most recent three months, primarily due to the cancellation of major projects centered in western Japan, shifting the sales growth in the first six months ended June 30, 2025 to a slight decrease.

Net sales in the Housing Products Sector increased 9% year on year. While the number of new housing starts have been on a decline since April, we maintained sales growth by continuing to focus on sales promotion for products for major house builders and direct sales to construction companies.

Construction Machinery Segment

Domestic shipments of crawler cranes, according to the Statistics of construction equipment (Units Sold), showed a 10.6% increase year on year in January-March, a 15.3% decrease year on year in April-June, and a 23.9% increase year on year in July-September.

In this segment as well, robust orders for crawler cranes and Foundation Work Equipments since the second-half of the previous fiscal year contributed to sales, and sales growth was achieved through efforts such as focusing on sales of used machinery.

IoT Solutions Segment

Boosted by growth in the security camera market, wholesale equipment sales remained solid. However, net sales declined over the most recent three-month period as system integration projects wrapped up in the first-half of the fiscal year, despite small-to-medium projects steadily following.

(2) Overview of consolidated financial position for the period under review

Assets

Current assets and non-current assets as of September 30, 2025 were \$83,474 million and \$34,187 million, respectively, resulting in total assets of \$117,661 million, a decrease of \$3,160 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly due to increases in cash and deposits of \$2,104 million and investment securities of \$362 million, and decreases in notes and accounts receivable - trade of \$5,488 million and electronically recorded monetary claims - operating of \$2,098 million.

Liabilities

Current liabilities as of September 30, 2025 were \$44,312 million, and non-current liabilities were \$2,075 million, resulting in total liabilities of \$46,388 million, a decrease of \$1,059 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly due to an increase in contract liabilities of \$1,363 million, and decreases in electronically recorded obligations - operating of \$1,460 million and income taxes payable of \$1,256 million.

Net assets

Total net assets as of September 30, 2025 were \(\frac{\pmathbf{Y}}{1,272}\) million, a decrease of \(\frac{\pmathbf{Y}}{2,100}\) million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to an increase in treasury shares of \(\frac{\pmathbf{Y}}{1,293}\)

million and a decrease in retained earnings of ¥1,230 million due to the recording of profit attributable to owners of parent and dividends of surplus.

The Company set up an Impact Neutralization Trust® (hereinafter referred to as "the Trust") in the third quarter of the current fiscal year based on a resolution of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on August 8, 2025. Through the Trust, the Company acquired 727,000 treasury shares via off-auction closing price trading (ToSTNeT-2) during the third quarter of the current fiscal year, and then sold 150,800 shares on the market, resulting in an increase of ¥1,305 million in treasury shares.
